India and South Korea Strengthen Ties in Logistics and Infrastructure Development

India's DPIIT and Korea Transport Institute (KoTI) signed an MoU on 10 February to enhance logistics collaboration. It supports India's PM GatiShakti plan through joint meetings, knowledge exchange, and smart solutions. This partnership strengthens bilateral ties, advancing India's infrastructure and positioning it as a leader in logistics modernization. <u>Read more</u>

Cashfree secures \$53 million from Krafton, Apis Partners

Cashfree, an Indian payment and API banking company, has partnered with Krafton, a South Korean gaming giant. Krafton, known for publishing PUBG and TERA, has launched several successful games. Cashfree has secured approximately \$53 million in equity funding, with Krafton as a key investor alongside existing investors like Apis Partners. This investment is expected to benefit both companies by expanding their market reach and enabling seamless direct-to-consumer (D2C) transactions across borders. <u>Read more</u>

BEML Ltd. and STX Engine Partner to Boost India's Defence and Marine Capabilities

BEML Ltd. and STX Engine have signed an agreement to co-develop and manufacture battle tank and marine engines, aiming to boost India's defence capabilities. This collaboration seeks to reduce import dependency and establish a strong domestic manufacturing base, aligning with India's '*Aatmanirbhar Bharat*' initiative. The partnership includes servicing, maintenance, and exploring export opportunities, positioning India as a leader in indigenous defence manufacturing. <u>Read more</u>



India and South Korea Collaborate to Strengthen Mechatronics Vocational Training

On January 20, 2025, India and South Korea agreed to a technical cooperation project called *Strengthening Vocational Education and Training in Mechatronics in India.* The Korea International Cooperation Agency (KOICA) will assist with the two-year project to establish vocational education and training in mechatronics in India, alongside NCERT at the Regional Institute of Education (RIE), Bhopal. The project includes preparing curriculum, textbooks, teacher's manuals, and equipment, and building teacher capacity. <u>*Read more*</u>

North Korea Erases South Korea from Map, Signaling Shift Away from Reunification

North Korea has adopted a new policy, reflected in a revised map from April 2024, which no longer includes South Korea's territory. The territory is instead labelled as *Hanguk*, a term used by South Koreans. This signifies a shift away from the goal of reunification, with Kim Jong Un pledging to designate South Korea as the "primary and immutable enemy" in constitutional amendments. The updated map leaves South Korean territory blank, unlike previous versions. <u>Read more</u>

South Korean Lawmakers Push Bill to Register Births of Undocumented Children

South Korean legislators have introduced a bipartisan bill to register births of non-Korean babies to protect undocumented children. This initiative, proposed by both the People Power Party and the Democratic Party of Korea, aims to align with the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child. The bill addresses the vulnerability of unregistered children to crimes like human trafficking, ensuring access to education, healthcare, and welfare. At least 4,025 unregistered babies were identified between 2015 and 2022. <u>Read more</u>

South Korea Overhauls Aviation Safety System After Air Busan Fire and Jeju Air Crash

South Korea is tightening aviation safety after recent fatal crashes. South Korea's Air Busan has banned power banks in overhead bins after a January 28 fire destroyed a plane. While the cause is unclear, new safety measures include crew fire training and inspections. Power banks must stay with passengers for quick response. <u>Read more</u>

South Korean FM Meets Chinese Ambassador to Strengthen Bilateral Ties

South Korea's Foreign Minister Cho Tae-yul met with Chinese Ambassador Dai Bing to discuss bilateral relations and regional issues, including the Korean Peninsula. Cho stressed the importance of strategic communication for regional peace and stability, while Dai affirmed China's commitment to strengthening ties with Korea and contributing to regional stability. Both sides pledged close collaboration for the upcoming APEC summit in *Gyeongju*. The meeting occurred amidst growing geopolitical tensions. <u>*Read more*</u>

South Korea's Foreign Reserves Drop to Lowest Level in Nearly Five Years

South Korea's foreign reserves fell to \$411.01 billion in January, a \$4.59 billion decrease. This is the lowest level since June 2020. The decline was due to interventions in the foreign exchange market, as the South Korean won weakened significantly. Foreign securities decreased, while foreign currency deposits slightly increased. <u>Read more</u>

South Korea and U.S. Conduct Large-Scale Live-Fire Drills Near DMZ

South Korean and US troops are conducting a three-week joint live-fire exercise at Rodriguez Live Fire Complex. The drills involve 2,000 troops and over 150 pieces of military equipment. These exercises aim to enhance combined operational capabilities and reinforce military readiness amidst rising regional tensions. *Read more*

South Korea Begins Development of Iron Dome-Like Missile Defense System

South Korea is developing a Low-Altitude Missile Defense (LAMD) system, similar to Israel's Iron Dome, to counter North Korean artillery threats. The project, costing 479.8 billion won (\$329 million), aims for completion by 2028 and involves the Agency for Defense Development, LIG Nex1, Hanwha Aerospace, and Hanwha Systems. The LAMD system will enhance air defence and protect key military facilities. <u>Read more</u>

South Korea to Invest Over 3 Trillion Won in Defense Technology Exports

South Korea is investing over 3 trillion won (\$2.06 billion) to boost defence technology exports in key sectors like AI and aerospace by 2027. Small and medium-sized arms manufacturers will receive up to 5 billion won each. The government will allow defence firms to extend work hours, supporting South Korea's push to enhance its global defence industry. <u>Read more</u>

South Korea Launches New Submarine Capable of Firing Ballistic Missiles

South Korea launched the *Shin Chae-ho* submarine, a domestically developed vessel capable of firing submarine-launched ballistic missiles (SLBMs). The submarine, the third of the *Jangbogo-III* Batch-I class, can operate underwater for 20 days and will be deployed in 2024 after tests. Approximately 76% of its components are locally manufactured.

South Korea Condemns North Korea's Demolition of Family Reunion Center

North Korea's demolition of the *Mount Kumgang* Family Reunion Center has been strongly condemned by South Korea as an "inhumane act". The centre, which cost 55 billion won (\$37.9 million) to build, hosted five family reunions between 2009 and 2018. South Korea plans to explore legal and diplomatic measures in response to the destruction. <u>Read more.</u>



North Korea-Russia Motorway Bridge Set for Completion by 2026

A motorway bridge linking North Korea and Russia across the Tumen River is scheduled for completion by December 2026. The Russian government has tasked *TonnelYuzhStroi* with designing and constructing the bridge. The 800meter-long bridge aims to enhance trade and movement between the two nations. <u>*Read more*</u>

South Korea Advances in Al with Open Al-Kakao Partnership

Sam Altman's visit to South Korea has boosted Al development, with *Open AI* and *Kakao* planning to integrate Al into *Kakao Talk*. Altman also discussed Al semiconductors and data center's with SK Group and Samsung. *Naver* is expected to increase Al efforts, with South Korea aiming to be a key player in the global Al race. <u>*Read more*</u>

SK Telecom will work alongside MIT researchers to explore AI advancements in information and communications technology, semiconductors, and bio-energy

SK Telecom is partnering with MIT to advance AI in ICT, semiconductors, and bio-energy. This collaboration includes *OpenAI*, *Coca-Cola*, and *Tata Group*. SK Telecom plans to launch an AIpowered personal assistant by March, utilising MIT's 'Astra' research. This highlights SK Telecom's dedication to AI innovation. <u>Read more</u>

AI boom to tackle domestic challenges

South Korea is actively promoting its AI sector to address challenges like low birth rates. The government plans to establish a public-private consortium to automate production lines and develop infrastructure for humanoid robots. They also intend to reform energy and financial policies to support the growing AI industry. <u>Read more</u>

South Korea Expands Financial Support for Nuclear Power Industry

South Korea will allocate 150 billion won in 2025 to support its nuclear power plant industry. This is a 50 billion won increase from 2024, to enhance the sector's competitiveness. The funding will strengthen the domestic nuclear ecosystem and support nuclear power development and exports. <u>Read more</u>

South Korea's Steel Industry on Edge as Trump Announces New Tariffs

The US imposition of a 25% tariff on imported steel and aluminum from March 12 has sparked worries in South Korea's steel industry, which relies on North America for over 10% of its exports. Although South Korea has a duty-free quota system allowing 2.63 million tons of steel exports to the US, changes like a flat tariff or reduced quotas are feared. This could raise US steel prices and disrupt industries. The aluminum sector is also at risk, with 30% of foil exports going to the US. <u>Read more</u>



Korea's Great Whale Project Faces Setback, but Exploration to Continue

The initial drilling for Korea's *Great Whale Project*, seeking oil and gas reserves, has been suspended due to insufficient hydrocarbon saturation. Despite this, promising geological signs were noted. Continued drilling has been urged, though the project remains controversial due to credibility concerns and budget cuts. Further exploration will seek foreign investment. <u>Read more</u>


